

PROTECT THE RIGHT TO PROTEST!

The rights to assemble and to protest are fundamental to democracy. They are included in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

Under the Police Crime, Sentencing and Courts (PCSC) Act, 2022, the police already have wide-ranging powers to restrict peaceful protest. For example, they may ban a protest if they think it will be too noisy.

Now, the government has a new Public Order (PO) Bill going through parliament. If the Public Order bill becomes law, it will further restrict the right to protest.

The bill proposes Serious Disruption Prevention Orders (SDPOs) which could be used to prevent people attending protests or taking part in some protest-related activities, even if they have never been convicted of a protest-related criminal offence.

To enforce the bans, the government plans to allow electronic monitoring. People with no convictions could be fitted with an ankle tag to make sure that they don't attend a protest.

The Manchester group of Amnesty International have made our own ankle tags with the Amnesty International slogan "Protect the Protest" to draw attention to the government's outrageous plans to restrict our human rights. Don't let the government get away with destroying your human rights. Once they are gone, it will be hard to get them back.




