JOURNALIST MOHAMED TAMALT DIES IN DETENTION

British-Algerian freelance journalist Mohamed Tamalt, 41, died in custody, on 11 December 2016, in Mohamed Lamine Debaghine University Hospital in Bab El Oued, Algiers, over 5 months after his arrest.

Mohamed Tamalt was arrested and detained on 27 June 2016. He immediately went on hunger strike in protest at his detention, before falling into a coma in late August. On 26 December 2016, Algeria's prison administration, the General Directorate for Penitentiary Administration and Rehabilitation, publicly announced that Mohamed Tamalt had died from an infection, citing the conclusions of an autopsy. Since he was admitted to hospital in late August, both the prison and health authorities failed to keep his family informed of his deteriorating health; nor did they notify the family of his death prior to the public announcement.

He was serving a two-year prison term for "offending" Algerian president Abdelaziz Bouteflika and various public bodies and officials in Facebook posts. The posts, which also featured on his blog, included a video with an allegedly subversive poem and images of President Bouteflika. Mohamed Tamalt was imprisoned solely for the peaceful exercise of his right to freedom of expression.

Amnesty International has called on the Algerian authorities to conduct a prompt, thorough and independent investigation into the events from the time of his arrest up to his death, including his allegations of ill-treatment. Amnesty International also calls on the Algerian authorities to ensure that if the investigation finds that he was subjected to such ill-treatment, those suspected of criminal responsibility are held to account in trials that meet international fair trial standards and without recourse to the death penalty.
