Below are some stories and ideas to help you start planning this year's fundraising activities.

Abbey Lights Out

Students in the Abbey School in Reading raised money for Amnesty by turning the lights off in the school. This was to highlight the plight of civilians in Syria left without electricity for long periods. Gemma Nells, the chair of the group, wrote this about the day:

"On Friday 30th October, all the lights at The Abbey School were turned off for one day. This was to raise awareness of the trouble going on in Syria - how 83% of lights have gone out due to the damage of the electricity grid and the vast amount of people that have fled the country. A poster was placed on each light switch in the school entitled 'Think before you flick' and some information informing students of these problems. This meant that people

were allowed to turn on the lights, but first had to pause and think about how we take lights for granted. There were several donation boxes around the school in order to try and raise money for this cause. The Amnesty group also did a school assembly in the dark about Syria and the lives of refugees, using famous people as examples to highlight that it could happen to anyone."
